Net Operating Tips By Mitch, W4RKV

When a mobile has been announced by the NCS and starts his/her run, there are usually a lot of stations waiting to work him, particularly if the county is a "rare one". The moment the mobile says "QRZ", stations will start calling, and anything the 'mobile adds after that, such as his call and or county, will be covered up by the Boomers. Since the term QRZ is the trigger, why not make it the LAST word voiced?

A format similar to the following should cut down on a lot of the doubling: "Kalawao, HI, N9CHU, QRZ?" This brief announcement says it all, and puts the QRZ at the end where it belongs.

(A further suggestion from KOAYO, Bob). During a mobiles "run" the county, state and MOBILE'S CALL should be announced every 5 or 6 calls or at a MINIMUM three times during the run. This only takes a few seconds (about two contacts) but will result in several contacts not being made by those who for whatever reason missed the announcement and worked the mobile just in case and then finds out it is already worked!

PHOENIX, ARIZONA DEC. 15, 1992

I would also like to express appreciation to Dorothy Johnson, WB9RCY for her fine efforts for many years holding forth as the USA-CA Awards Custodian and the author of the Awards Column in CQ Magazine. Dorothy, thanks to you for your ten full years of effort.

If you will all take the time to provide input on the operating guidelines, I will do the data collect and publish a revision at the appropriate time.

Thanks for your input and I am looking forward to hearing from you.

Dateline CW By Ed, KN4Y

The great tragedy of county hunting--the slaying of a beautiful mobile run by a world wide contest.

Be sure to check the contest calendar before embarking on a weekend trip just to run counties. A world wide CW contest on frequency can be like working a county during a rock concert. Some like the challenge,but not everyone makes love while skiing down hill. This would also apply to those who schedule mini conventions.

The SSB county hunters net on 14336 KHz was silent, but the CW net on 14056.5 KHz was going strong. What had happened to silence the KW jawbones? Something had to be done quickly, the psychotic wards were filled to capacity with alumni who were no longer able to QRM the sideband net, and suicides were increasing as many hams had no bench mark for tuning up. The SSB net must quickly get back into operation or the country medical system and State hospitals would go belly up.

Various investigative agencies were called but were unable to explain this unspeakable phenomenon. Finally, five times around Harry was called in to help. He noted there were more participants on the CW net then usual and concluded whatever happened affected only the SSB net, some of whom had checked into the CW net.

But, further investigation indicated Harry's initial assumption to be incorrect. The culprit was a superb super glue that had accidently been put on the flaps of 9.2 cm X 16.5 cm envelopes, the type county hunters use to mail MRC's, and when a county hunter licked the flap the lips stuck together. Both SSB and CW operators were affected, but since CW operation does not require the flapping of the lips the CW note continued in session. The SSB operators who had kept their CW skills active just moved down the band and kept working counties, until their lips came apart. Those who had not kept their CW skills sharp were destined to go shopping with their spouses. Divorce lawyers would no longer answer their phones. Daycare centers started designs for additional space. Many felt as useful as a beeper on a cadaver.

The morale of this story is to keep your CW skills active. You never know when you may have to be one with A1. One good way to keep your skills sharp is to work and run counties on both nets. This may mean an extra resonator when mobile, which can, by the way, be changed with your lips stuck together.

Keep in mind that the CW net does not have mobiles running all the time and when you dial in 14056.5 KHz you may hear nothing. If you are mobile send "CHN? de (your

call)". If no response, check your frequency, and if okay call, "CQ CHN de (your call), County, State, QRZ." What happens next will surprise you, settle back and start working the calls at your CW speed and have a ball (net speed is about 18 WPM but is flexible and will quickly adjust to the mobiles speed). Beware. CW operation can be addictive.

Dorothy Johnson, WB9RCY, the CQ USA-CA award program chief is gone, just when you get them trained they retire and the cycle starts over. Thanks Dorothy for a job well done and try CW. Don't worry about your CW speed, you can be slow, or you can be fast, or you can be half fast, you will like it. P.S. please don't forget to mail my plaque and shut off the lights before you leave.

Speaking of contests, is everyone ready for the annual county hunters 10 meter CW party? If not, now is the time to get that resonator tuned to the novice portion of ten meter band and get ready to operate, there should be more mobiles active the cyar if the CW CHN mobile activity is any indication. The contest announcement should be published soon.

Call CQ CH when you QSY off the CW net frequency and not CHN which means county hunters net. When you QSY you are no longer on the net, so keep this in mind. However, use CHN when calling on the net frequency used on other bands. For example, 7035 or 21056.5 KHz.

The mobile is putting out a clean 599 signal when suddenly, like a toothache, the signal develops a chirp or burp. This could be caused by a gassy operator (hi) or most likely low voltage. Tell the sender so the mobile can be started and the battery recharging. Usually the chirp is no longer heard. Last month I mentioned that I had sent a batch of MRC's to the QSL bureau on 11/3/92 and so far I have received two back. One enclosed in the trip schedule from W3DYA and one direct from N5OLZ. Stay tuned for further developments.

Members Speak!

WN3C, Mac -- A lot of county hunter (CH) news is passed on the CH Nets. This information (counties to be run, trips, new USA-CA numbers, etc) is disseminated on the nets through out the day as mobile activity permits. For myself, and I'm sure many others, I'm usually not able to listen to the nets except when I'm out running counties, so I miss a lot of news.

I propose that we make use of the extensive amateur packet bulletin board system (BBS). Got a trip planned? Send a packet message addressed to CHN@USA and we all can get the news before it's too late. For example: Subject: Trip Planned Text: Going to MD eastern shore (including Kent) and DE 1500Z, 18 December - 0200Z a9 December 92 20m ssb, 20 cw, 40 ssb and cw available. Send your needs to WN3C@WB3V.MD.USA

Got a new USA-CA number? Let us know on CHN@USA packet BBS. Maybe we could ask the USA-CA awards custodian to send these when they are awarded? How about the MARAC awards custodian? The Mobile QSL Bureau? Maybe these folks have some news they would like to get out quickly. I hope all are receptive to this proposal and take advantage of the packet BBS. A few words of caution, PLEASE, no "For Sale", no gripes, no complaints, no soap boxing, in CHN@USA bulletins. There are enough of those kinds of bulletins and they only serve to alienate the sysops. And finally, don't send your needs as a bulletin. Send them only in a direct reply to a station that has requested needs in a bulletin. Good hunting.

W4IGW, Ed - I have a small gripe for some of the mobiles that operate on the net. It seems that many do not announce their county anytime during the run. I am a retired person who is as busy as the proverbial one armed paper hanger and can not spend all my time at the rig. I am either in and out of the shack or the car and frequently hear a strong signal from a mobile who keeps saying QRZ and never says what the county is even when the calls begin to get fewer. Perhaps he or she will say "anyone else" and stand by. I know that sometimes the allotted 10 minutes seems like precious little time to put out that rare county but I believe many calls are made by stations who do not really need the county butt call anyway for fear that they might need it. I certainly believe it would help to announce the county at least two or three times during the run. Sometimes I can hear the mobile better than the NCS or assistant, who usually announce it at the beginning and end of the run.

W5ILR, Ed - I have been sitting here this morning listening to

a discourse on the net frequency concerning the proper method for listing the date on an MRC. I'm not sure what MARAC's instruction or position is on this issue...I agree whole heartily that finding 10-12-92 on an MRC is very exasperating. There is very definitely two accepted approaches to this problem. Which one should we use? I recommend the following, which I consider a SENSIBLE APPROACH, not withstanding it's other acceptable points. Put the day first, the moth next, and the year last. Example, 10 DEC 92. Note that the month is spelled out. In county hunting I would advocate there is no one, DX'er or otherwise, who does not know and understand what the letters DEC stands for. A standard abbreviation for the months should be: Jan, Feb, Mar, Apr, May, Jun, Jul, Aug. Sep. Oct. Nov. Dec. Even using this approach when OSLing a DX'er would straighten out questionable contact dates. Any DX operator could readily find what MAR stood for if he didn't know immediately. I highly recommend MARAC consider accepting and re-publishing for all to know, the suggested method for listing dates. Thanks. (Editors Note: Awards Chairman's slip for Last County Awards require the use of MO-DA-YR (01-20-93) to speed up the input process)

KA2CNG, John -- State abbreviations in MRC have always been a problem for county hunters especially the newcomers to our organization. We better hope that Andy Rooney never joins MARAC or the QSL Bureau is going to have a real headache. Andy has a short essay in his most recent book "Sweet and Sour" that should bring a smile to county hunters. Here are some of his observations. The use of the word ALSO helps the receiving station understand his report easier. We are still plagued by Tuner-uppers that if they have a dummy it is at the wrong end of their rig. Some times stations telling the interfering station to QSY block out the CH

station worse than the tuner-upper but it all works out fine in the end. Sometimes too the interference is accidental like this Nov when I ran mobile thru TN (or is that Tenn, Editor??) some idiot kept sending long dashes on the net. Imagine my chagrin when I discovered the idiot was ME. I was setting my key in my lap between transmitting periods and each time I leaned forward my tummy pressed the key and blurted out a DAH.

The basic certificate is issued for making at least 1500 contacts on ANY ONE BAND, with seals, etc for higher levels and endorsements for band and mode. Cost is \$10. for members, \$20. for non-members. List of contacts should be submitted in any of the available books or computer print-out. Complete details available.

GUIDE LINES

Issue 12 January 1992

1.0 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

- 1.1 These guidelines are provided by the Mobile Amateur Radio Awards Club, Inc. as a service to County Hunters. MARAC does not sponsor, provide net controls, or act as a governing body for any county hunting nets. Most county hunting nets are administered by independent county hunters following the guidelines given here, more or less, for the common good and efficiency of those attempting to make county contacts.
- 1.2 The procedures described here are recommended guidelines only and are not intended to define rules for net operation. These guidelines cannot cover all situations, therefore good judgement and common sense should always prevail. At all times, the procedures and net operation must be in full compliance with FCC rules.

2.0 THE COUNTY HUNTING PROCESS

- 2.1 GOALS Most serious County Hunters work toward the ultimate goal of making a confirmed contact with another Amateur in each of the approximately 3,076 counties in the United States. The basic award is issued by CQ Magazine at several achievement levels, starting at 500 confirmed counties. MARAC also issues a number of similar awards.
- 2.2 NET OPERATION The achievement of the various awards is greatly facilitated through the use of a controlled net. Mobile stations that with to run counties and fixed stations that wish to work counties, operate on the selected frequency.

2.3 NET PARTICIPANTS

- .1 NET CONTROL STATION (NCS) A volunteer, preferably fixed station, who coordinates activities on the net in an orderly and controlled manner.
- .2 RELAY STATIONS One or <u>more</u> fixed stations, that can hear signals from those parts of the country not heard by the NCS, and who will assist the NCS in the operation of the Net.
- 3 MOBILE STATIONS Mobiles that have checked into the net for the primary purpose of running a county or county line. To qualify as a mobile, the station must be independent of external power supplies and antenna systems, i.e. must be capable of moving away without making any connections, disconnections or changing the antenna in any way.
- .4 WORKING STATIONS Any other stations on the net.
- 2.4 WRITTEN CONFIRMATION OF CONTACTS A most important step in the awards process is to obtain a written confirmation of the contact. Both CQ Magazine and most MARAC awards require written confirmations to be in the hands of the applicant at the time of award applications. Written confirmations are initiated by those needing the confirmations.

3.0 SSB NET OPERATING PROCEDURES

- 3.1 GENERAL The following describes typical procedures used on the SSB County Hunting Nets. Actual procedures and techniques may vary according to the experience of the participants and the NCS.
- 3.2 PURPOSE AND PRIORITIES The first priority of the nets is <u>emergency traffic</u>. The second priority is running mobiles in counties. These activities take priority over other net activity.

3.3 SSB OPERATING FREQUENCIES -

- 14,336 Khz is the frequency of the 20 Meter Mobile Emergency and County Hunters SSB Net. It is in operation every day.
- 7,238 Khz is primarily a calling frequency used by stations that cannot make contact on 20 meters..
- 3,865 Khz is used for net operation in the evenings of the winter months, especially during sunspot cycle lows.
- 21.338 Khz is often used for contacts on 15 meters.
- 28.336 Khz is often used for contacts on 10 meters.
- 3.4 MODE OF OPERATION These procedures apply to two way SSB operation. CW contacts on the SSB Net are disruptive and are discouraged; moreover, cross-mode contacts are not valid for USA-CA or MARAC awards.
- 3.5 PRIVILEGES OF THE NET CONTROL STATION The NCS and the relay station(s) HAVE NO SPECIAL PRIVILEGES. They are in the position of being able to initiate mobile contacts that are not available to other stations on the net; and they should be extremely careful not to abuse their position. THIS APPLIES TO QUERIES as well as county contacts. The control stations should neither initiate contacts with mobiles who are not running, nor query mobiles for special counties, unless the same privilege is extended to other net participants.
- 3.6 WARM-UP SESSION County Hunters will begin to gather on the Net frequency prior to the formal start-up of the Net. A preliminary period is usually necessary to establish control of the frequency. County Hunters should never attempt to gain control of the frequency or cause interference if it is already in use. A nearby frequency should be selected temporarily until the net frequency is clear.
- 3.7 DETERMINING THE NET CONTROL STATION THE NCS is always determined on a volunteer basis. The <u>relative</u> location of the NCS and the Relay stations is important. Net Control may be assumed for any length of time but a minimum of one or two hours helps to maintain continuity and reduces the loss of the time associated with changing the Net Control. The NCS should give some advance notice of when control will be relinquished; this alerts others, who may wish to assume NCS, so they can be prepared.
- 3.8 STARTING UP NET OPERATIONS The new NCS should announce This is WØABC assuming Net Control of the Mobile Emergency and County Hunter's Net. My name is Joe and I'm located in Logan County, North Dakota." The NCS

may also make a short statement on the purpose of the net and tell how the listener can obtain more information about the net, stressing the emergency nature of the net and secondarily working counties.

For example, be careful about repeating this too often as it can become tiresome and wasteful of net time. The NCS will then ask for one or two stations to assist as Relay stations (Assistant Net Controls).

- 3.9 CALL FOR MOBILES The NCS should periodically put out a call for new mobile check-ins. Mobiles are recognized and added to the list in the order in which they are heard. The NCS then should ask the Relay station to put out a call for new mobile check-ins. The NCS should make a special effort to give every mobile an opportunity to check in with everyone listening. Obvious newcomers should be briefly told how the list operates, & given an estimate of the wait involved before they will be called to run.
- 3.10 WHEN MOBILES MAY CHECK IN Mobiles should check into the Net when the NCS calls for check-ins. Alternately, the mobile should break the NCS or Relay Station, between mobile runs, and ask to be checked in.
- 3.11 NCS PRIORITIES The NCS should use the following priorities in handling the business of the net:
 - 1 Emergency traffic, of course.
 - 2 Assisting mobiles to run counties.
 - 3 Information breaks to announce a mobile running off net frequency. Such a mobile will have few, if any, contacts until an announcement is made on the net.
 - 4 Any request or query from a <u>mobile</u>. (Note mobiles wanting a a contact for county credit should <u>try to get it by working the mobile what is running</u>. Ask the NCS for a contact <u>only when you can't hear the other mobile</u>.)
 - 5 Queries for last counties or one of the last 50 in the country.
 - 6 Other queries and comments have no priority.
- 3.12 KEEPING A LIST OF MOBILES One of the very important duties of the NCS is to keep a sequential list of mobiles in the order in which they should be run. Suggestions for maintaining the list are as follows:
 - 1 Start with a list of mobiles arranged in the order in which they will be called to run their counties. Announce the next two or three mobiles to run, whenever possible.
 - 2 When a mobile runs a county, move the call of that mobile from the beginning of the list to the end of the list.
 - 3 Add new mobile check-ins to the <u>end</u> of the list. They should never be placed ahead of mobiles who are already listed and waiting to run.
 - 4 If a mobile runs off net frequency leave his call in place on the list. Such a <u>off-net run does not count as a turn on the Net.</u>

- 5 If a mobile does not respond when called, call him again in 20 or 30 minutes. After two or three no shows, remove his call from the list, unless he is a regular on the net and is known to be a working person in and out of the vehicle a lot. If that mobile shows up later, replace his call near the beginning of the list.
- 6 Don't give <u>list priority</u> to mobiles on special trips or on county lines. Do be especially attentive to their needs for making contacts, moving off frequency, etc.
- 3.13 STARTING A MOBILE RUN The NCS calls the mobile and determines that the mobile is ready to run a county. If the NCS doesn't have good copy on the mobile, the NCS may ask the Relay station or some other station with good copy to handle the run. Assuming that the NCS is handling the run, the NCS announces "We have W5XYZ who is going to run Cass County,Texas." The Relay station is then asked to repeat the announcement.

The NCS then starts the mobile run by --"W5XYZ this is WØABC. Your starting time is 1530Z and you are 5 and 9 from me". The mobile then responds. The NCS acknowledges the report from the mobile and says "go ahead and run Cass County, Texas for the Net. Let me know when you are ready for relays" THE NCS SHOULD NOT RELAY UNLESS THE MOBILE ASKS FOR RELAYS!

3.14 THE MOBILE RUN - After receiving a starting time from the NCS, the Mobile has the option of putting out a general call or directed calls to selected stations or groups of stations. A typical call may be --"QRZ DX and mobiles only, W5XYZ mobile in Cass County, Texas".

The mobile acknowledges each calling station with the call sign and a signal report. The calling station, in turn, acknowledges the signal report and replies to the mobile with a signal report. The mobile acknowledges the returned report and puts out another "QRZ". The cycle is repeated until an exchange has been made with all the calling stations or until the allotted time has expired. The mobile should repeat his/her call and county several times during the run.

It is important that the county and mobile call sign be announced at frequent intervals. This will help to minimize the "what's the call / county" queries.

Do not use "bang bang" and "rifle-shot", or "speed limit" type of signal reports. Remember, there are always non-county hunters monitoring or just listening, some of them being influential officials, and we should be careful of the image we project.

3.15 REQUEST FOR RELAYS

1 - When the Mobile begins to have difficulty completing contacts or when the time limit is nearing, the MOBILE SHOULD ASK FOR RELAYS. The NCS may break in and offer to help with relays. The Mobile may also initiate the request for help. The proper time to make this request is a matter of judgement - it should be delayed as long as reasonable because direct contacts are usually completed more efficiently than relays.

2 - As the run progresses, the station running the mobile should be alert to those stations that are calling but not successful in making a contact. Be careful because many stations do not want relays. A relay list can be started if you know that the calling station will accept a relay. Otherwise list them only if they respond to the calls for relays.

A call is then put out for relays -"I have W1KKP and W6RXY, anyone else needing a relay to W5XYZ mobile in Cass, Fexas, call W4XRK". After the list is developed each station is individually relayed to the mobile. If time permits, additional lists may be taken from other parts of the country. Once relays have started, the mobile should make contact only with stations that are being relayed.

- 3 The NCS should be sensitive to the desire for some stations to NOT be relayed. He should offer their calls for relay only after they respond to a call for relays.
- 4 Double relays are sometimes necessary if the secondary relay station has poor copy on the mobile. They are easy if done properly. The secondary station calls for double relays and repeats the calls as he hears them. The primary station makes a list of the calls as they are repeated by the secondary station. When the list is complete, the primary station feeds the calls to the mobile, one at a time and the secondary station tells them to go.
- 5 Requests for a "direct" contact during relays should be held until relays are completed; relay time should be used to aid those stations actually needing relays. Direct contacts can then be made on the mobile's last call, time permitting.
- 3.16 WHEN THE TIME LIMIT IS REACHED Once a time limit has been established, it is important that it be strictly adhered to. The mobile and the station running the mobile share the responsibility for terminating the run when the time limit is reached. The Net is returned to the NCS at the end of the run.

The NCS should ensure that the number of "Last Calls" should be limited to one or two calls, particularly if the net is extremely busy.

3.17 MOVING A MOBILE OFF FREQUENCY - The NCS may ask for a volunteer station to move a mobile off the net frequency to complete a run or to make a run. Since many stations that can hear the mobile may not hear the NCS, a good technique is to have the mobile call for a station to move the mobile. These off-frequency runs should be handled with care. The need for them should be minimized by efficient operation of the net and a special effort must be exercised to be sure that the alternate frequency is available and reasonably clear.

Once it has been announced that a mobile station is moving to another frequency, DO NOT interrupt the net proceedings further to announce the frequency. Those who need the county will find the frequency without further help.

3.18 WHEN THE MOBILE RUNS OUT OF THE COUNTY - If the mobile has been running only for a short time, the NCS may elect to continue the run in the new county. In that event, the new county should be announced before proceeding.

3.19 SIGNING THE MOBILE OUT

- 1 At the end of the run the station running the mobile checks the mobile out by "W5XYZ this is W6ARK. Your sign out time is 1540Z. What is your direction of travel?" The fixed station then announces, once more, the mobile's call, county and direction of travel and then returns the Net to the NCS. (If time permits, and at the discretion of the NCS, the mobile may be asked to make a last call with a limit on the number of contacts specified by the NCS.)
- 2 After being signed out, the mobile should not respond to any further calls from stations desiring the county without the NCS's approval.
- 3.20 KEEPING THINGS MOVING Some of the things that can be done to facilitate runs and improve the continuity of the net are:
 - Don't stretch short runs.
 - 2 Don't milk the relays. Take one list and stop.
 - 3 Limit the number of tries that a station gets.
 - 4 Take relays from one direction only or only one list from each NCS.
 - 5 Don't take relays.
 - 6 Be firm about queries. Queries that have to be relayed by the NCS are particularly disruptive of the smooth flow of the net.
- 7 Tell the mobile to not make a last call.
- 3.21 BREAKING STATIONS The proper time to break the net depends upon the urgency of the information being sought or passed. The following priorities should be followed when breaking the net:
 - 1 An emergency is usually indicated by a double break or "BREAK - BREAK" and may be used at any time to break the net for a bona fide emergency. The NCS needs to be polite to strangers who use this unknowingly.
 - 2 A break to announce a mobile running off frequency is usually indicated by "Information Break". It is high priority and can be made during a mobile run but discretion should be used to use natural breakpoints in the run.
 - 3 Routine inquiries are usually indicated by "Break" or "Query", and should be handled <u>between mobile runs</u>, if at all. Such inquiries should be greatly limited during busy mobile periods a more appropriate time would be during "Calls, Comments and Queries". (Also, see section 3.20.)
- 3.22 CALLS, COMMENTS AND QUERIES During periods when there are no mobiles ready to run and Net activity is at a slow pace, the NCS can keep the frequency occupied by announcing -"Any calls, comments or queries? WØABC, Net Control".

This is a general invitation for any station to make a directed call to another station, make a general comment, ask a question, inquire about log information, announce planned trips, etc. When several stations respond, a call list is developed by the NCS in the same way as the mobile list. Stations are acknowledged in the order that they are heard and asked to make their calls. The NCS should limit the number of stations on the list so that a frequent check for mobiles can be made. A mobile wanting to run a county always takes priority over a 'Calls, Comments or Queries' list. The NCS should alternate with the Relay station in taking additional lists, if necessary.

3.23 KEEPING THE FREQUENCY CLEAR - This is primarily the responsibility of the NCS and the Relay stations. Unless so requested by the NCS, all other stations should refrain from attempting to clear the frequency. Any station attempting to clear QRM should keep in mind that he or she is a representative of the net and that his/her actions reflect on the net. The rule is UNFAILING COURTESY. The other station's conduct has no bearing on ours; WE MUST BE COURTEOUS AT ALL TIMES.

- 1 Don't tell the interfering station that it is on the net frequency unless it actually is. If he is 1 Khz below, tell him so. That will reduce argument and the cases of a station moving from 1 Khz below to 1 Khz above.
- 2 In the case of deliberate interference, the only measure to be taken, after first asking the station to QSY, is to completely ignore the interference. This will be difficult, but, if left alone, the interfering station will usually cease.

On some occasions, the best answer is to temporarily move the Net away from the interference and then to move it back when the QRM clears up.

- 3 Don't tell an inquiring station the frequency is in use unless it actually is. "In use" means it is being transmitted on and just listening does not constitute use. If the net goes into open session and net activity ceases then the frequency becomes available to all stations.
- 3.24 REQUEST FOR A NEW NET CONTROL- The active NCS should give some advance notice of his intent to give up the net, i.e., "I will run two more mobiles and then ask for a new net control". Then, when the NCS must give up the net, a call for a new NCS is made.

In the transition from one NCS to a new NCS, it is of utmost importance to maintain the continuity of Net operations and the rotating sequence of active mobiles. The departing NCS should pass a list of the active mobiles, their approximate locations, and the rotating sequence to the new NCS. The new NCS should maintain the previous mobile list but before proceeding, a call for additional mobiles should be made.

3.25 PUTTING THE NET INTO OPEN SESSION - If no one NCS volunteers, the NCS should announce his intention to place the net in open session. He should first read the list of mobiles, make an effort to get the first mobile station started, then announce that the net will be in open session and sign himself clear. After the mobile station has exchanged reports with the stations he can hear he should relinquish the frequency to the next mobile on the list, and so on.

The departing NCS should not impose operating criteria on the net. Leave with dignity.

4.0 CW NET OPERATING PROCEDURES

4.1 GENERAL - Many of the procedures on the CW Net are similar to those on the SSB Net. Therefore, this section will deal primarily with the differences. The typical operating speed is about 16-20 WPM but some stations will slow (QRS) down as needed. Also, the NCS should not transmit at speeds above 20 WPM. It is recommended that the word "NET" should be used as many times as possible, i.e. "THE NET HAS JUST RUN K5XYZ/M IN JONES, TX." This will let other stations know we are running a Net. EMPHASIZE NET AT ALL TIMES. The use of the identifier "CHN" as frequently as possible helps this.

4.2 FREQUENCIES AND TIMES - The CW Net meets at 14,066.5 Khz. It can be recognized by use of the "CHN" (County Hunter's Net) signature. 7,035 Khz is used as a calling frequency for stations that cannot make contact on 20 meters.

The Net is most active on holidays and weekends but is generally active nearly every day. It usually meets for at least an hour or two beginning at about 1400Z every day. Mobile trips are frequently announced and announcements are given as to the mobiles stature. The net usually remains in session all day saturday and Sunday, if there is mobile activity. It is often open longer during weekdays if a mobile is on a pre-announced trip.

4.3 MOST FREQUENTLY USED Q SIGNALS -

QNI - Used by the NCS to invite any station to check in or to break the net for information or a query.

QNO - Station is leaving the NET.

QRT - Station is closing down.

ONC - Please copy the following information

QSP - I relay or please relay.

QRV - Are you ready to copy, run, etc. or, I am ready.

QNZ - Please zero beat this frequency.

QRX - I will call you or I will stand by.

BK - Break the net for information or a query.

QSX - I will be listening.

QTA - Please cancel or unable to copy. (used when a station loses copy on the mobile while mobile while being relayed; same as "scratch it" on SSB.

NIL - Nothing is heard.

It is suggested that you obtain a copy of the ARRL QN signals and keep them posted in your vehicle for handy reference as you travel. 4.4 NET CONTROLS - The CW Net seldom has a lengthy list of mobiles. Therefore, the need for the duties of a formal NCS is somewhat reduced. The CW Net is somewhat more informal. ON occasion the net will run reasonably effectively without a recognized NCS.

It should be noted that the net runs considerably more efficiently with an NCS. All participants should assist the NCS when requested, and to take over as NCS when necessary.

4.5 KEEPING A LIST OF MOBILES. - Unlike the SSB net, a regular rotating list of mobiles is usually not kept on the CW net. Rather, each mobile checks in (QNI) with the NCS when in a new county and ready to run (QRV). At times there will be more than one mobile ready. The NCS will acknowledge the mobiles in the order they are heard, tell each what order they will run in, and inquire if they wish to wait their turn (QRX) or QSY off net frequency. When a mobile QSYs and runs off frequency, he is removed from the list of those waiting to run and should again QNI with the NCS when QRV in a different county.

Because of the fewer number of CW mobiles active on the net at any given time the 10-minute-per-run limitation is optional.

(During times of heavy mobile activity, such as convention time, the NCS may impose a time limit at his discretion.) However, the average run on CW requires less than 10 minutes to complete, unless it is an extremely rare county (Kalawao, 2nd District of AK, etc.)

Suggestions for conducting the net are:

- 1 Make a temporary list of mobiles waiting to run (QRV).
- 2 When a mobile runs a county, remove his call from the list.
- 3 Add each new mobile check-in to the end of the waiting list, unless they choose to QSY and run off-frequency.
- 4 Don't give list priority to mobiles on special trips or on county lines. Do be especially attentive to their needs for making contacts or moving off frequency, etc.
- 4.6 MOBILE CHECK-INS The CW Net is quite informal and a lot of initiative rests with the mobile. The NCS will usually ask for mobile check-ins after each mobile run. Another method is to work a mobile that is running and tell he/she that you are QRV. A third choice, if a rag chew is in progress, is to send BK in a gap in the conversation. In any event, be sure to indicate that you are mobile.

Information breaks to announce a mobile running off the Net frequency of a mobile break-in should be given priority. THAT MOBILE IS LEFT WITHOUT CONTACTS UNTIL SUCH AN ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE ON THE NET THAT A MOBILE IS QRV.

Office when you tune to the Net frequency, you won't hear any ast astituty. Don't be discouraged; that can be because there is at NTS and or no mobile running at the time. Just call, CHN 6s KINYZ M. If the net is active, someone will answer

Follow the instructions given by that station. If none are given, go ahead and run your county. (The "CHN?" followed by the station's call is also used by fixed stations that want to inquire on the status of the Net.)

4.7 RUNNING A COUNTY - The procedure for running a county is essentially identical to that on the SSB Net. The NCS will announce the run, exchange signal reports with the mobile, and tell the mobile to go ahead (GA).

Before a mobile is to QSY off Net frequency to run, the NCS will announce his county and frequency. The NCS should then ask the other mobile waiting to run on net frequency if he needs the QSYer's county before he/she moves off frequency. Since both mobiles will be running at the same time on different frequencies, this gives them a chance to work each other for their county.)

The mobile then calls "CQ CHN de K5XYZ in Jones, TX QRZ K". Both stations repeat the signal reports that they receive. At the end, the mobile can ask the NCS for any QSP. If there is not NCS the mobile can call "any QSP?" a couple of times and hope that someone steps in to help. At the end of the run, the mobile announces the next county and ABOUT how long it will be. It unsure of the next county or time interval, the mobile simply sends "QNI next". The NCS relays the announcement to the next.

On a QSY to other bands, either station can initiate the calling although it is much better if the fixed station calls the mobile In most cases the mobile will follow the same calling procedure used on the 20 Meter CHN.

4.8 RUNNING OFF THE NET FREQUENCY - To run off the Net frequency, the mobile announces that "K5XYZ/M will QSY up 2 (or down) for Smith County, Texas". The announcement should be repeated by the NCS or some other station on the Net. The mobile then moves (usually down) to the first clear frequency at least 2 khz away so as not to interfere with the Net. 14,070 Khz and above is usually buss with RTTY, AMTOR & Packet Modes. The NCS should recommend the mobile "QSY Down". Code practice is no longer held on 14,070 so that freq. can be used for a QSY if it is clear.

4.9 NET INFORMATION - It would help the net operation if a mobile when checking in would advise the NCS of his/her intent to either standby on the net freq. or QSY to another frequency / band. If the mobile is going to QSY then the band / freq. must be given to NCS so it can be announced. It would be helpful if the mobile would advise NCS of the bandapabilities when checking in. The mobile also needs to let NCS know when the mobile is quitting for the day.

5.0 COUNTY HUNTING - GENERAL

- 5.1 RECORDS MAINTAINED BY THE NCS Each NCS should maintain a log of each mobile run during the period of his/her control. The log should include the date, starting time mobile call sign, and the county and state.
- 5.2 RECORDS MAINTAINED BY THE MOBILE The mobile operator has an important responsibility to log east contact. The stations worked may be asking for a written stationary of that contact. Some mobiles log with a tags resurred and later transfer the log to paper. Other mobiles

prefer to log directly on a paper log. Whatever the method, a written log is a necessity.

5.3 DOUBLE LOGGING - One form of double logging is acceptable. The so called 'team' contacts, wherein one person acknowledges a signal report and another returns a signal report while both amateur callsigns are logged will be accepted for purposes of <u>MARAC</u> Awards for contacts, except for the YL award.

The double logging of contacts on CW is NOT recommended.

Double logging of contacts made after April 1, 1985, are <u>not</u> acceptable for the USA-CA Award. So-called "team contacts" wherein one person acknowledges a signal report and another returns a signal report while both amateur call signs are logged, are NOT valid for USA-CA; acceptable contact can be made with only one station at a time. (From USA-CA Rules & Program, Section B; CONDITIONS, PARAGRAPH 5.)

5.4 DEFINITION OF A COUNTY LINE -

- 1 A county line is that legally defined boundary separating two governmental entities. In most cases, the best evidence of the location of a county line is the county marker permanently mounted beside a highway. The marker will be assumed to be correct for county hunting purposes, except for those at wet lines (see below).
- 2 A county line may be run with credit being given for both of the counties. The requirement is that a part of the vehicle must be in each of the two counties.
- 3 A "wet line" occurs when the two counties are separated by a body of water, such as a river or a lake. A wet line may <u>NOT</u> be run for county hunting credit. There are several reasons for this rule; one reason is that a vehicle can seldom be parked legally and safely on a wet line.
- 4 Three and four county lines may <u>NOT</u> be run for county hunting credit. A reason for this rule is that a vehicle cannot be parked legally and safely on most three or four county points.

5.5 RESPONSIBILITIES OF ALL STATIONS -


1 - When you don't know what's going on the Net, don't talk - listen! Never ask "WHAT'S THE COUNTY?". Wait for the frequent announcements. During the course of a typical run, the mobile's call sign and the county will be announced a number of times.

When a station is asking for a particular county, the NCS should allow the mobile to make that determination. If the net is busy, the NCS may ask both stations to QSY for a personal QSO.

- 2 Assist the NCS only when help is requested. If the NCS asks for help, don't just start SENDING state your call sign and wait for the NCS to recognize you.
- 3 Never cross-talk under Net activity. Always direct comments to the NCS or Relay station at the proper time.

- 4 When there is no NCS, the first station to pick up a mobile running should take the responsibility of announcing the mobile's county and state, helping with relays and announcing the next county, if any.
- 5 Maintain a high degree of patience and restraint at all times. If complaints are in order because of poor operating practices, they should be aired later or via telephone or mail to those concerned. Never openly lose your temper on the Net.
- 6 Do not use unusual phonetics. Cutesy or contrived phonetics tend to interrupt the smooth flow of the mobile's run while he attempts to mentally decipher the unusual words into the letters of a call sign.
- 7 Do not attempt to make contact after the mobile has been signed out. In special circumstances, the NCS may allow you to make the contact if so requested. INTERRUPTION of the Net for routine contacts must be avoided.
- 8 Do not ask a mobile to break the net to give you a contact for a county unless that county is your LAST in the state or one of your LAST 50 in the country. If you need a county not being run, offer to take the mobile off frequency so that all may have the opportunity to work the county.
- 9 Assist the QSL Bureau and the awards custodian by providing valid addresses for new mobiles on the net.
- 10 Don't hold up the Net with trivial queries for the mobile. A trivial query is: "Are you going to Jones County? That's one of my last few in that corner of the state." Save the queries for last counties in a state or for one of the last 50 in the country.
- 11 PAY YOUR DUES DO YOUR SHARE BY SERVING AS NCS, as Relay station, and/or by taking mobiles off frequency to run their counties.
- 12 All stations active on the Net should acquaint themselves with the procedures to be used in their areas to help a mobile in trouble, i.e., telephone numbers of the State Police, etc. Most states have emergency numbers listed in the County Hunters Handbook. If you do acquire a new emergency number, be sure to pass it along to the Editor of the Handbook so it can be included in the next Edition.
- 13 Stations on the Net should stand by during an emergency unless they are asked to help. The NCS and Relay station will ask for help if they need it.
- 14 Be sure to thank the newcomers that pick up the net. Be careful not to criticize errors they might make because of being new to CHing.
