Net Operating Tips By Mitch, W4RKV

All of us are aware that under FCC rules no one amateur, of group of amateurs, may claim the exclusive use of any frequency; however, once established on an unused frequency we have the right to its use reasonably free of adjacent channel QRM. But in today;s crowded bands, the term "reasonable" should not be construed to mean "clean channel" where no other station should get within 5 kHz of us.

The current state-or-the-art seems to dictate a bandwidth of about 2.1 kHz for SSB communications, and that is the general rule of thumb I use when acting as NCS. If another station starts up on 14.334 or 14.338 and is strongly interfering with me, I may go and REQUEST that if possible he move a little farther away. But as long as he is 2 kHz of more away, I don't feel I have the right to DEMAND that he move. If he is buck shotting or otherwise over modulating, I may request that he turn his mike gain down a little, or perhaps turn his amp off, but I will always put it in the form of a request and abstain from making any demands.

Dear Van,

Over the past several months, the Executive Committee has received numerous letters of complaint concerning MARAC awards. At the Murfreesboro Mini Convention this topic was discussed. A report was given by Gene Tyree, N4ANV, stating that he had been trying to assist you with this but that the issuing of awards continued to be behind. He also stated that the issuance of awards had been held up due to the delay in setting up the account in Texas and the transfer of funds from Minnesota. The Treasurer takes exception to this excuse because the transfer had been made within one week of the National Convention and deposit slips had been forwarded to you at that time.

It has come to our attention through these complaint letters that their checks for the awards have been deposited, however, they still have not received their awards. We have received complaints from W5VRA, N8BGF, N8ELQ, KD8HA, KD8HB, KC5YV, WB7ZIZ, K0AYL, K8CW, and WA7NNH. WA7NNH has announced on the air that he will no longer process any MRC cards until he receives his awards.

The Executive Committee backed you completely when you were seeking this position with MARAC. While we are sympathetic in view of your accident and understand that you have changed jobs, we feel that the membership of MARAC has suffered. We have not seen a report of activity from you since August.

It is imperative that some disposition be made of these complaints and problems at the earliest possible convenience.

When planning a mobile trip to run counties check out the CW contests that may be scheduled, that is the big ones like the SS and DX. During a biggie contest the CW net frequency of 14.056.5 MHz becomes a part of the contest and the interference makes net operation difficult. According to the first book of Ed, zero beating a frequency is not band abuse.

1994 MARAC County Hunters CW Contest

The MARAC 28th Annual County Hunters CW Contest will be held from 0000Z May 7 to 2400Z May 8, 1994. Mobile and fixed operation from every county in the US is welcome and operation from less active counties is encouraged.

RULES: Fixed stations may be worked once on each band. Mobiles may work other mobiles and fixed stations on each band from each county. Mobile contacts from county line count as one QSO, but the receiving station may count both counties as multipliers. A station must not operate more than one transmitter at a time.

EXCHANGE: RST and QTH (County/State (US), Province (CANADA), and Country (All others).

SCORING: QSOs with US fixed stations are worth 1 point, with US mobiles 3 points, and with DX 3 points. Contact with stations under Net Control are invalid. FINAL

SCORE Total QSO points multiplied by total different US counties.

Mobiles who operate from more than one State calculate their scores (1) For individual State Certificates and (2) for Total Score for overall plaques. Total Overall Score must not count a county more than once regardless of the State from which it was worked.

FREQUENCIES: 3.575, 7.040, 14.050, 21.050, 28.050. Fixed stations should operate above these frequencies and mobiles operate below them.

AWARDS: MARAC Certificates - First Place FIXED in each State, Province (Canada), and Country. First Place MOBILE in each State, with a minimum of 10 QSOs from each of at least 3 counties activated.

MARAC Plaques - First and Second Place Mobile and Fixed stations in US. First Place DX station. For purposes of this contest, DX is any country other than the US, Canada and Mexico.

Sample Log and Summary sheets are available for a #10 SASE from the address below. A check list of counties is required for entries with 100 or more counties worked.

Detailed Overlay Maps By Sonny, W5VDW

For several years, I have been using a detailed road atlas to aid in the location of county lines in Texas. "The Roads of Texas" is of such detail that one can locate gas and oil pipelines, telephone lines, air navigation beacons, cemeteries and a host of other landmarks. For the most part, the maps are on a scale of 1 3/4 inches equals 6 miles. I understand that the makers of these maps are in the process of printing atlases for other states.

There is another publisher of State Atlases which are a bit less detailed. These atlases are printed from topographic maps prepared by the U. S. Geological Survey (USGS) and are on a scale of either one inch equalling four miles or one inch equalling 2.5 miles. These are certainly of sufficient detail to locate county lines when marking is as sporadic as is found in Texas. The company printing these maps is the De Lorme Mapping Company, P. O. Box 298. Freeport, ME (1-800-225-

5669). Currently, atlases have been prepared for twenty-five states, however, others are constantly being released to the book stores. The last addition to the list was the State of Alaska. It will be interesting to see if this one shows the "Judicial Districts" or the "Southeastern, South Central, Northwestern and Central" Divisions.

These atlases are not inexpensive; the price ranges from about \$15.00 to \$25.00!!

A NEW AWARDS PROGRAM FOR THE SERIOUS COUNTY HUNTER

The underlying concept of this proposed award program will probably offend many county hunters but the fact is that county hunting as currently practiced is not much of a challenge. I say this even though it took me 18 years to nail down USACA 715. The truth, however, is that my county hunting was an on-again, off-again proposition. Those who have monitored 14.336 MHz for the past 10 years will agree that except for my

mobile expeditions, my call was seldom heard on the net. And according to several active county hunters, USACA has been achieved several times in less than a year (I understand the record is six months and 10 days, start to finish). Lets face it, folks, all it takes is persistence. Basically, the key to USACA is turning on the rig, tuning it to 14.336 MHz and waiting for the counties to drop by. When it gets down to a dozen or so, maybe a few telephone calls are needed to arrange contacts, but even then those contacts are likely to be on 14.336. That's why I'm proposing a new county hunting award program that requires at least a little effort on the part of county hunters.

Following are the key provisions of the new awards. Since I still have to work for a living, and since I will not make any money on the awards, I don't want to waste my time designing certificates and setting up processing procedures unless the county hunting community is genuinely interested in the program. So, please read the following and let me know if you are interested in participating. If, and only if, there is enough interest, I'll go forward with the program. Send your comments (a postal card will do) to me at P.O. Box 2499, Capistrano Beach, CA 92624.

WORKED ALL COUNTIES THE HARD WAY

- 1. Engage in two-way contacts with licensed amateur radio stations in each of the counties and judicial districts of the United States. Each station may be worked one time only. Thus, if a station is worked mobile or portable in one county, that station may not be worked again in any other county, including the home county. You can use county hunter or any other net contacts, but remember one county per station. This means that you must carefully chose which county to claim for each mobile station you work because once you claim a contact, you cannot every again claim other contacts with that station.
- 2. You must include contacts on each of any five authorized amateur bands each time you apply. A minimum of 10 contacts are required for each band. For example, 460 contacts on 20 meters and 10 each on 160, 75, 10 and 6 meters are acceptable as would be 100 on each of the five bands. At least two modes of transmission must be included each time you apply. A minimum of 25 percent of the claimed contacts must be made on the other mode or modes. All authorized modes are acceptable and the 25 percent "other mode minimum" can be satisfied with any combination of modes. For example, 375 single sideband contacts and 125 CW or 75 CW, 25 RTTY, 15 facsimile, 1 ATV and 9 slow scan contacts would be acceptable. The only requirement is that all be direct contacts made without the use of repeaters or digipeaters. However, satellite and earth-moon-earth contacts will be accepted.
- 3. At least 1000 counties must be claimed for the initial application, but the initial application can be for any greater number. Your certificate will indicate the number of counties worked. Each subsequent application (except the last to finish

- up) must include at least 500 additional counties, but these too may contain any greater number of counties. Each application will yield a new certificate showing the new total of counties worked (I don't have the time or money to get involved in seals and ribbons).
- 4. A unique serial number will be issued for each certificate, but since the actual number of counties claimed on each application will vary, separate lists of numbers for each level of achievement will **not** be kept. However, a separate list of numbers will be kept for the final worked all counties certificate.
- 5. Confirmations are **not** required, but the certificate wording will indicate whether or not confirmations exist. Certificates for those applying **without** conformations will contain the phrase "...has claimed contacts with amateur radio stations in XXX counties..." Certificates for those applying **with** confirmations will contain the phrase "...has confirmed contacts with amateur radio stations in XXX counties..."
- 6. Since it will probably take a while for all 3076 counties to be worked under these rules, a box score that lists the number of counties claimed or confirmed by the top county hunters will appear in the **Road Runner** at least once every three months.

BINGO THE HARD WAY

- 1. Engage in two-way contacts with licensed amateur radio stations in each of the counties and judicial districts of the United States. The first letter of each station's suffix must be the first letter of the county claimed. If the county name consists of two words, the first two letters of the suffix must be the first letter of each of the two words in the same sequence. For example, N6SDB is acceptable for San Diego county, but N6BSD is not acceptable. The same sequential rule applies to counties with three-word names. For example, W6SLO is acceptable for San Luis Obispo county, but W6LOS is not. For Alaska, the suffix must follow the district but the call sign's number may be used. For example, both KL7FJD and NIJDQ are acceptable for the First Judicial District. For the few counties with four-word names, the suffix must match the first three words of the county name. For example, KA0LOT is acceptable for Lake Of The Woods county, but KA00TW is
- 2. The letter "X" may be used as a wildcard PROVIDED the sequence rules stated in Rule 1 are followed. For example, KB5EXR is acceptable for East Baton Rouge, but W5ERX is not. There are no other wildcards allowed. Contacts with a station having a USA-CA number cannot be substituted for the required suffix sequence.
- 3. Most of the rules for the Worked All Counties the Hard Way Award apply for this award as well. However, the multi-band and multi-mode requirements of that award **do not** apply for this award.

The fee for these awards has not yet been determined, but it will be the minimum required to cover my costs. Since each certificate will be printed "to order" on my laser printer, the majority of the cost will be postage and envelopes. Most likely it will be in the \$1 to \$1.25 range.

Well folks, there you have the basics of my proposed awards program. Yes, it will be much harder to finish up the new awards than it is for the current awards, but that's why they're called "...The Hard Way." Even if you're not interested in participating yourself, I think you'll agree that working them all this way is a real achievement in which one can take great pride.

Members Speak!

W5VDW, Sonny -- As I near the last counties for "third time around", I again find myself with a lot of "listening time". For the most part, I have been using that time to catch up on matters that have been put aside, such as, some genealogical work for both my family and my wife's ancestors. As I listen, I am still amazed at some of the practices that are condoned and some of the "policies" that just I fail to comprehend.

I think that the most incomprehensible of all are the interpretations concerning Yellowstone National Park and the Four Corners USA. On the one hand, one can make contact in Yellowstone National Park and take credit, on a one-time basis, for any one of four counties although there could conceivably be a distance of sixty to seventy miles from the more distant county. On the other hand, one can not "work" the four counties in the Four Corners, USA as a single contact because an automobile can not be parked over the USGS marker--a distance of approximately nine feet. In my book that just doesn't make sense!

Additionally, the USA-CA RULES AND PROGRAM as published in the Counties Record Book perpetuates the "Parks and Reservations" policy. If the USA-CA Custodian has the capability to check contacts for the validity of contacts made

from "parks and reservations", he has a much better map library than the Departments of Agriculture and Interior. In a Department of Interior publication, "National Parks and Landmarks", a directory of National Parks and other related properties, there is listed 278 properties comprising 30 million acres. This publication does not include any of the National Forests (225 million acres) or the lands under administration of the Department of the Interior (Bureau of Land Management Reservations, Bureau of Indian Affairs Reservations or Bureau of Reclamation Lands) which comprise another 300 million acres. Few road atlases are sufficiently detailed to determine the boundaries of these "reservations".

Since the Mobile Emergency and County Hunters Net has no governing body, it is unlikely that any great changes will be made, however, I can hope that some notice will be taken. We are in the "cycle" when radio communications propagation is less than ideal and most of us aware of that condition, yet, I find a growing propensity for "control" stations to reiterate over and over their inability to hear stations. If the control station and assistant can not copy a weak station and are reluctant to ask any other station for relay, then, forget the relay. It makes no sense to go through a multiplicity of explanations that the station is too weak to copy.

At times, it is necessary to cut the mobile station's run to eight minutes. When that is done, control stations need to do as much as they can to conserve time, also. Why is it necessary after every run to recognize "queries", "information calls" (which are in the nature of personal messages), "next three mobiles to run" and a variety of other time-consuming exchanges. Solicitation of "calls, comments or queries" really has only one purpose—to hold the frequency when a mobile station is not available or ready to run. I know we are not "time-management" engineers, but a little self inspection seems to be warranted.

With the request that someone assume "net control", there always seems to be a dearth of silence, but the recent effort to chastise individual stations because they seem to be on frequency and make contacts most of the time seems to me to be a lack of judgment and downright insulting. If there is no one willing to be net control, so be it! Obviously, stations who will not pick up net control are aware that their failure to do so will not cause the demise of the world.

THE ROSE GARDEN AWARD

Those who have received my latest personal QSL card will see listed among the awards "THE ROSE GARDEN AWARD". I hadn't had much occasion to think of that award since some of the more prominent "hecklers" haven't been around for some time. I believe Stan Head, W8KOI (K8OI) is the "father" of the award and it received its name from a song made popular by Lyn Anderson, a country singer on the Lawrence Welk Show, in which there was a line, "I never

promised you a rose garden". If memory serves me correctly the award was given to all of those who attended the 1973 Convention in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

A variety of hecklers have made their views of the County Hunters' Net known. Three have been much more persistent than others. Out of respect to those who have passed on to the Great Beyond, I'll not give any call signs. One, a resident of northeast Texas, was a highly intelligent person whose rhetoric could lose one in the "fog of gobble degook" before one had an opportunity to take more than a short breath. His mode of operation was very simple, he would call on the frequency and pretend that he heard no one and carry on his monologue. Invariably, at some time during his transmission, he would use the phrase, "no one promised you a rose garden".

The second heckler, most of you have known and have heard until rather recently when the FCC suspended his license for a year. I'll not describe his antics because most current county hunters have experienced his operation.

The third, few of you have heard. He has been absent from the frequency for some time, but did show up on recently for a short time. His method of operation is to "camp out" 2 khz from a net frequency and call CQ. This heckler operates from Wichita, Kansas. He is a very intelligent person and professes to have all sorts of "analyzers" with which he monitors his own signal and that of all others with whom he comes into contact. He has an ego which knows no bounds. Needless to say, his point of view is infallible and he will listen to no appeal for relief from his interference.

Fortunately, these three hecklers have one trait in common...... like small children with a short attention span...... they soon tire of their own antics so long as no one reinforces their enjoyment by trying to heckle them. The best approach is to ignore them. A single request by a Net Control or Assistant Net Control Station is appropriate, provided that the request is one of those "kill them with kindness" requests. Other stations should refrain from any attempt to question their operating practices or in any other way insult them. In this era of "pass-band tuning", "IF Shift" and narrow band filtering, the antics of these hecklers can serve to try our expertise in the use of our equipment rather than an ability to trade barbs.

Next is to work and confirm all county and county state lines. As per the USACA rule, county or county state lines that are separated by water, (river, stream, creek or lake) will not count. Using one of the available County Record Map Books, a Rand McNally Road Atlas and a red marking per, all the "wet" county lines were marked on each state map.

There are those who question "wet" lines, but only because they do not know how to interpret the rule. Then, state by state through the coloring book, use some sort of identifying mar (X) to indicate the possible county and county state lines. Here again, is reason for disagreement. Many points where counties join, there will be no way of reaching it except on foot. Checking and re-checking many times, I came up with 6,584 county lines and 760 county state lines. I have 4,135 and 275 lines respectively confirmed. This is probably impossible, but it is a challenge and a means of "keeping a finger in the county hunting pie". See you on a county line.



CATEGORIES: Only single operator mobile or fixed stations are eligible. One person must perform all operating, logging, and spotting functions.







By now this problem has been solved and while I offer no excuses there were certain circumstances that were unforseen by me which were the underlying causes of these delays.

AWARDS COMMITTEE ACTIONS:

The work on the Capital Cities Award should be wrapped up soon and the Committee's recommendation forwarded to the Executive Committee for action by the Board. This is the procedure that will be used in dealing with all issues involving additions/changes to the Awards Program.

Currently the Awards Committee is considering the following issues;

- 1. A suggestion was received that the Plaque for the Karl Atkins Net Control Award for 1000 hours as NCS be issued free of charge and that this be retro-active to include all those that have already qualified for this level. I am expanding this suggestion and ask that the Basic Award as well be issued free of charge because there is only two dollars difference between the Basic Award and the plaque since upgrades are already issued at no charge. The reason for this suggestion is to encourage participation as net control. An application form would be created to transfer "Log data" which is already required for this award. Based on applications for this award as of this date the financial impact of this suggestion will not constitute a burden for the Awards Program.
- 2. Prior to, during and after the National Convention in Seattle I have received many comments concerning the rule that a NCS or Mobile of the Year Award cannot be a repeat winner and the majority of those thought that the person that they voted for should receive the award regardless of how many times he/she had received it before. Based on these comments and suggestions, I am asking that the rule be reversed and allow the actual winner of the most votes to receive these awards.
- 3. I am suggesting that we discontinue the practice of issuing

plaques to those who are "nominated" for County Hunter of the Year and issue plaques only to the winners. It is felt that this is an unnecessary expense and that these plaques are not "valued" by most recipients because it only reminds them that they were nominated but did not win.

4. From time to time the number of stations required for the Cliff Corne and Jack Scroggins awards need to be updated and I have received suggestions that both these be changed. Due to the number of 2nd Time Around Award holders, the number worked to achieve the different levels of the Jack Scroggins Award need to be increased and as soon as a decision has been reached we will announce this in the news letter. Since the current top level of the Cliff Corne Award for working USA-CA holders is 1000 and un-attainable, a change in this award is not needed.
